Louis J. Robichaud

Louis Joseph Robichaud (born

October 21, 1925 in Saint-Antoine, died January 6, 2005 in Sainte-Anne-de-Kent), better known as Louis J. Robichaud or P'tit Louis, was a politician Canadian. He was Premier of New Brunswick from 1960 to 1970.

He began his political career at a very young age by being elected in 1952, at the age of 27, deputy for the constituency of the County of Kent. He was re-elected in 1956.

In October 1958, he took over the leadership of the New Brunswick Liberal Party, which he led to victory in the 1960 general election by defeating the Conservative government.

Robichaud was sworn in as Premier of New Brunswick on July 12, 1960 at the age of 34 and then became the second Acadian to hold this office after Peter Veniot and the first Acadian to win an election as Premier.

His government won the elections again in 1963, then in 1967, and Louis J. Robichaud thus remained Prime Minister for 10 years, until 1970.

By the time Louis J. Robichaud took office, New Brunswick society was a two-tier society, with Acadian regions among the poorest in the province and a French-speaking minority having few institutions and hardly any services in French.

He then set up the Equal Opportunities for All program, a wealth redistribution program that established common standards for all citizens. He then engages a social movement similar to the Quiet Revolution of Quebec.

An ardent defender of the French language, his role was decisive for the future of Francophones in New Brunswick by passing the Official Languages Act, which made New Brunswick the only officially bilingual province in Canada. He also contributed to the establishment of a Frenchlanguage school network, with the founding of the Université de Moncton being the culmination.

Louis J. Robichaud ultimately lost the 1970 general election against the Conservatives led by Richard Bennett Hatfield. He then resigned his seat in the Legislative Assembly and his position as leader of the New Brunswick Liberal Party in 1971.

In the same year, he became President of the International Joint Commission, a position he held until his appointment to the Senate of Canada on December 21, 1973.

He retired on October 21, 2000 and returned to end his days in New Brunswick. He was diagnosed with cancer in 2005. He died on January 6, 2005 at Stella-Maris-de-Kent hospital, after a few weeks of illness.
